Preserve Hikes

Name three of your favorite foods. Mom's homemade cookies, my mini bread and curly noodle soup.


What do you like best about kindergarten? Ummm, I like kindergarten the best because my teachers are so nice.





Recap of Our Latest Events...

Broadband Conversation #2, January 20, 2021: Mark Greene, chair of the Long Island Broadband Exploratory Committee, joined FIBTF Chair Janann Sherman to talk about Long's Public-Private Partnership with Consolidated Communications (CCI) to build a fiber broadband network funded and owned in part by the Town of Long Island with CCI funding and owning fiber connections to homes, and providing broadband internet service.

Broadband Conversation #3, January 27, 2021: Roger Heinen of the Islesboro Broadband Committee spoke about their municipally owned fiber system, which delivers 1 gigabit service to all subscribers for \$360/year. Through this Publicly-Owned model, Islesboro owns and controls the infrastructure and GWI, a Maine-based internet company, operates the system. Property taxes of roughly \$8 per month per \$100,000 valuation pay off the \$3.8m bond for the build-out of the system.


Grandma And The Bears

The Scent of Time

It's funny how recollections are triggered. For me, the smell of people, places, and time (yes time) have always stirred memories long since forgotten. I came to grips with this recently when my 21-year-old daughter phoned me." Dad" she said," I miss your smell." "Huh," I replied," I just miss it, that's all." My first thought was of my own grandfather, and of me sitting outside his office waiting to have my first meeting with him. As I entered his office I took in a deep breath, my nostrils flared, as I took it all in. His cologne, the oak desk, the leather-bound library of books. The office itself had a classic "aged" aroma. Everything left indelible olfactory impressions on me.

I thought of my daughter's comment as I made an inventory of all smells that made my memories awaken. The smell of Spring, life renewed (with all the allergies that come with it). The smell of my grandmother's neck when I hugged her tight (and her Chanel No 5) The fresh salt air from the bow of the ferry, my children as newborns. As you draw in a bouquet of similar aromas, memories will awaken.

I recounted my list to a gathering of Aunts and Uncles on the Island one summer, and instead of thinking I was a bit off (which I'm sure I am) they gazed off and quietly recounted their own scented memories. Many people I find, think that of the five senses, that smell is the least important. I have to disagree.

Across from the old schoolhouse on the island is a magnificent garden – The owner places speakers in amongst the flowers and plays classical music every day for one hour. "Tchaikovsky's, The Waltz of the Flowers, The flowers love it," she says – Fragrances abound – Who am I to argue.

Dear VH Community,

It's been over 6 months since I moved to Vinalhaven and started working as your school principal. The time has flown by, with second semester greeting us next week!

Some people might define this year by mask wearing, Covid fears, or "how many ways we missed out on something." I see it differently. It's been a year defined by extraordinary efforts to discover silver linings. Here's a few observations from inside the building.

MASKS. Kids are impressively adaptable. The rush out to recess run, climb, swing, spin, dig, chase, shoot, yell and laugh - with a mask on. Yes, masks become wet, gross, and broken, so we have an enormous supply of colors, materials and sizes. We've all learned how to talk louder, listen more closely, and read partially hidden facial expressions. And just so you know, those masks with clear plastic in the front don't work...

TECHNOLOGY. We have exciting new technology that can make learning more engaging, whether we are in the building or remote. Someday, we'll be able to invite the community inside for a hands-on technology fair. You'll be amazed at the skills teachers and students have gained this year.

FLEXIBILITY. Every week the staff prepares to teach either onsite or remote. If elementary or middle school or high school initiates a change, everyone quickly adapts. This week, we are still practicing flexibility as staff take on new roles, trade off supervision responsibilities, and offer new options for learning because students needs continually change.


BASKETBALL AND SUBSTI-TUTES. Our goal this year has been to increase safety by drastically reducing the number of people going in and out of the building. Teachers have gone to great lengths to be present - they minimize being "away", and somehow, they rarely get sick. Plus, we cover for each other to reduce calling substitutes. But, we've recently allowed "outsiders" into the gym, because kids need to move and have fun. It's true, there is basketball after school for every kid from first grade to seniors! Coaches focus on skills and exercise, not competition. So even though kids and coaches wear a mask, and it's not a "real" season, it's still a bright spot to have basketball help break up winter months!

COMMUNICATION, COLLAB-ORATION AND CREATIVITY.

The amount of staff time reading and sending emails, meeting before and after school, and "zooming" is enormous. That's what it takes to collaborate and find creative ways to teach kids. In addition to lesson plans and coordinating special events, there are meetings every single school day regarding meeting the needs of individual students. Staff at VH school care about kids.

What can you do to make a difference in the success of VH students? Every time you ask a student about school, and encourage them to go to school (every day), you are making a difference. That's how any of us get better at basketball, reading, math, science, art, music or recess. Show up and try.

Read. Read a little bit more. Tell a kid about what you've read. Read



to a kid. Read with a kid. Ask them about what they've read. Let them see you close Facebook and pick up a book. If they read 10 books, take them to do something special. Every single book exposes new vocabulary, insight into the world and people, helps increase success for future learning, and reduces day to day stress. The school is promoting DEAR-VH (Drop Everything And Read). That's for ALL of us. It makes a difference.

Annual Report of the Operations of the United States Life-saving Service Wreck of the Schooner Leaping Water, March 1887 Thomas J. Young of Vinalhaven was a crew member

March 27—At half-past 9 o'clock at night of the 26th, during a strong westerly breeze and clear weather, the schooner Leaping Water, of Vinalhaven, Maine, bound to Lincolnville, from New Bedford, Massachusetts, ran on old Cilley Ledge, eight miles southwest of the White Head Station, (First District,) coast of Maine, and became a total wreck. She had a miscellaneous cargo and a crew of four men. Owing to the darkness and distance from the station, she was not discovered by the patrol until daylight the following morning (27th). The surf boat was immediately launched, and, after a hard pull of two and half hours, the life-saving men boarded her, and found that she was abandoned and fast breaking up. It was thought at the time that the crew had been picked up by a three-masted schooner which was seen to pass inside with a small boat in tow. The surfmen assisted a party of wreckers in saving most of the cargo and then returned to their quarters. Three days later, (30th), hearing that the vessel's crew had not been heard from, the station force went to Metinic Island, between five and six miles to the southward, cruised along the shores, and made every effort to obtain tidings of the missing sailors, but without success. From information subsequently received it appears that they took to their boat as soon as the accident occurred, and, losing the oars, made a line fast to the schooner to ride by, but the end slipped and they were cast adrift at the mercy of the wind and seas, being buffeted about for thirteen hours, having nothing but a piece of board to steer with. Finally, much exhausted and almost frozen by exposure to the cold, they made a landing on Matinicus Island, some sixteen miles to the southeastward from where they were wrecked, and were kindly treated and cared for by the inhabitants during a period of five days, when they were taken to Rockland in the packet schooner Julia Fairbanks.

Finnish Cookies

from The Finnish Cookbook by Beatrice A. Ojakangas

My mother-in-law was a Finn. This recipe comes from a Finnish cookbook she gave us. These cookies are part of the "coffee table," meant to be served when friends come over for coffee. I get the impression from the cookbook that Finns get through the long winter with a combination of coffee, sugar and butter, an idea I can endorse.

Basic Cookie Dough

- $-2\frac{1}{2}$ c softened butter
- 1 c white sugar
- 5 c white flour
- ¼ tsp salt


Anise Cookies


- 1 tsp ground anise
- 1 egg

- **Nut Cookies**
- ½ c ground almonds or walnuts for the dough, plus more for sprinkling.
 - granulated sugar
- **Diagonal Cookies**
- jam
- $-\frac{1}{2}$ c confectioners' sugar
- 1 T hot water
- Cinnamon Cardamom Nuggets
- 1 tsp ground cardamom
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1. To make the *basic cookie dough* cream the butter and sugar together with a mixer. Gradually add the flour and salt. The mixture will be crumbly. Work the dough with your hands until the warmth of your hands forms it into dough. Divide the dough into four equal parts.
- 2. For *nut cookies*, mix the ground nuts into the first quarter of the dough. Roll into a log 1 inch in diameter. Cut into 1/8 inch slices. Sprinkle with more ground nuts and granulated sugar. Put on a greased cookie sheet. Bake 7-10 minutes in a 350° oven.
- 3. For *diagonal cookies*, take the second quarter of the cookie dough, and roll it out into four logs about ½ inch in diameter. Put them on a lightly greased cookie sheet. Using a knife, make a crease lengthwise in each log. Bake 10 minutes in a 350° oven. Remove and fill the crease of each log with your favorite jam. Return to the oven and cook about another 10 minutes until the cookie edges are lightly golden brown. Remove from the oven. Make a glaze of the confectioners' sugar and paint it over the logs. Once the logs cool cut them in 1-inch diagonal pieces.
- 4. For the *anise cookies*, take the third quarter of the cookie dough and add anise and egg. Mix well. Roll out the cookie dough on a floured surface about 1/8 inch thick. With a crimped edge pastry wheel cut the whole dough into diamond shapes. Transfer them to a greased cookie sheet. Cook for 10 minutes at 375°.
- 5. For the *cinnamon cardamom nuggets*, add the cinnamon and cardamom to the last quarter of the cookie dough. Roll into strands about the thickness of a finger and chill in the refrigerator until they are stiff. Cut into 1/2 inch chunks and put them on a greased baking sheet. Bake 10 minutes at 375°.

It is easy to burn these cookies, so watch them carefully while they are in the oven. Once when I was cooking these for Christmas I left them in the oven a little too long. When I took them out, I wanted to cool them off as fast as possible so I ran out to the garage and put the cookie sheet on the top of our old Saab. I forgot them. Later in the day I drove off with cookies still on top of the car. Miraculously, the cook sheet stayed on the car, but the cookies flew out to my neighbors, spreading some unintended Christmas cheer.

Applesauce Cake

I submit this recipe for applesauce cake at the urging of several people. Best made with Vinalhaven apples! Full recipe great for large family or company. Easy to make half a recipe for smaller needs.

1-1/2 cups raisins

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1-1/2 cups brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1-1/2 cups thick, unsweetened applesauce
- 3 cups sifted flour (I use spelt) 1-1/2 tsp baking soda 3/4 tsp. salt 1-1/2 tsp. cinnamon 3/4 tsp. ground cloves 3/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 3/4 cup chopped nuts (optional)
- 1. Cover raisins with boiling water and set aside to plump the raisins.
- 2. Cream butter. Add sugar gradually, beating until well mixed. Add eggs and beat well. Stir in applesauce.
- 3. Sift together flour, baking soda, salt, and spices. Stir into apple-sauce mixture.
- 4. Drain raisins well. Add raisins (and nuts, if used) to batter. Pour into 3 quart baking pan.
- 5. Bake at 300 degrees for about 1-1/4 hours.

LEMON ICING

(A must. Really complements the cake)

1/3 cup butter

Grated rind and juice of one lemon 2-3 cups confectioners sugar Small amount of extra water if needed.

Cream butter, add grated lemon rind and blend. Add 1/4 cup confectioners sugar gradually. Stir in lemon juice. Add rest of confectioners sugar, mixing until icing has creamy, spreading consistency.

Reading Online Wind on a Kindle

A Shrink's Take on Dating Hint: It's supposed to be fun.

I'm a clinical psychologist, and over the years, and I've had a lot of opportunities to work with people who are dating, either for the first time, or the first time in a long time. People generally describe dating as a miserable experience and approach it with emotions ranging from anxiety to terror. In fact, I've had a number of people tell me that they've stayed in bad marriages for years just because they dreaded dating so much.

A lot of dating advice seems to be taken from the "How to Be Popular in High School" manual. There are usually a lot of over-complicated tips for how to present a façade that will get people to like you. Following this advice, people obsess over writing the perfect profile for a dating website, or picking something to do for their first date that they think will really impress their date. In contrast, the most important thing I've learned about dating, and the thing that people most often overlook is very simple: just be yourself.

Dating is not a popularity contest; the objective is not

to go out with as many people as you can or get as many people to like you as possible. The purpose of dating is not to impress someone, it's not a job interview. The objective of dating is to find one person you like, preferably someone who also likes you, and then spend some time together to see how things go. Dating is about discernment, not

popularity. The idea is not to get someone to like you, but to figure out if you like each other. If you go out with someone on a first date and things don't click, that's a success, not a failure. Trying to impress someone to get them to like you creates the same problems as trying to impress an employer to get a job. If you succeed, then you have to continue to pretend to be someone you are not. In the long run, you are better served being yourself and letting the chips fall where they may. Here are some of the most important things I've learned about dating:

• Date a lot of people casually, and then one person at a time seriously. Don't spend a lot of time chatting online, texting, building up to a phone call, etc. None of that really helps you get to know someone, and it creates way too many opportunities for you to talk yourself out of meeting someone for purely imagined reasons. No matter how much the technology improves, there is still no substitute for good oldfashioned meeting face-to-face. It's still the most reliable way to tell if you and another person will connect. If you have any interest in someone, don't waste a lot of time trying to figure things out. Go ahead and meet them for coffee and see what happens.

- Don't obsess about when to text or call someone, whether it's too soon and you'll look needy, or how long you should wait, etc. Keep it simple. If you want to talk to someone, call them. If you don't, don't call them. Hopefully they will use the same straightforward principle with you, and then it's very easy to figure out where they stand. If they call you, you know they want to talk to you. If they don't call, you can be pretty sure they are not that interested in talking.
- The criteria for going on a second date with someone is whether you had a good time on the first date. Again, keep it simple. If you enjoyed yourself

see them again. Don't worry about whether they've been single long enough, or too long, or they're not into you enough or too into you, or too old or too young, or whatever other arcane criteria you've been using for dating. Keep it simple, if you had a good time, see them again. If you didn't have such a great time, but it was at least pleas-

ant, and your intuition is that things might go better the next time, then go ahead and see them again. People are often very anxious on a first date and don't put their best foot forward. If you hope to be in a relationship with someone for the rest of your life, then what you are looking for is not how they are right now, but how they change and adapt over time. This is a long-term investment you are considering, so see them again and you may be pleasantly surprised.

• Believe it or not, dating should be fun. Suggest things to do that are fun, things you like to do, not things you think the other person might like. If you suggest something fun that you like, the chances are better than you will be more relaxed and let more of your true self show through. Having coffee is fine for a first date, but it's a lot of unnecessary pressure

to have date after date where all you do is sit and talk with each other. Get out and do something fun, something silly where you get a chance to let your hair down and get to know each other in a variety of ways. Dating is a part of your social life, it's not a job. If dating starts to feel like a job, you probably should take a break and spend more time with your friends.

• Think of dating as a great way to learn more about yourself. Every person you date gives you very helpful information about yourself; what you like and don't like, what works for you and what doesn't work. Dating also gives you lots of opportunities to speak up about what doesn't work for you, and if you are divorced, this is probably something you could use some practice with. Dating gives you lots of chances to say "no thank you" to people when a relationship isn't working for you, without feeling like you have to make up a lot of extraneous excuses. Ending a relationship because it's not working for you is the only reason you need to end a relationship, and when you get down to it, it's really the only reason people end relationships.

• Keep in mind that the goal of dating is to one find one person you think you might have a future with (unless you are looking for multiple partners, but that's a subject for another column). I find getting to know one person intimately at a time to be all the challenge I need. The thought of doing that with two or more people at the same time is overwhelming. When you find someone you like, someone you think you may have a future with, let them know you want to have an exclusive relationship so that you can see if there is a future.

Tidbits from the Vinalhaven Historical Society

HURRICANE – Henry Mossman from the Harbor moved his family and household goods over here Saturday and will make this his home for the present. He will occupy the Crowman house and will be engaged in boxing granite.

Courier-Gazette February 8, 1887

Ira MacDonald and twin daughters Marjorie and Marguerite returned Monday from the Snow Bowl Carnival in Camden.

Courier-Gazette February 20, 1941

Jane Quinn celebrated her eighth birthday last Wednesday afternoon by entertaining a group of friends at her home. Those present were Jane and Judy Quinn, Helen Shields, Douglas Stone, Delma Mills, Roseanne Burgess, Bodine and Jimmy MacDonald, Jeannette Hopkings, Louise and Patsy Morrison, Lucille Quinn, Patsy Calderwood, Fletcher Burgess, Alden Mills, Jack Brown, Dana, Marylyn and Nancy Sherer. Those invited, but unable to attend were Dennis and Ellis Brown. Games were played and a pleasant afternoon spent. Ice cream and birthday cake were served.

Courier Gazette, January 29, 1946

The hospitality of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Crockett caused Nebo Lodge to form an outstanding impression in the minds of four men who recently left Northeast Harbor in the teeth of a northwest gale to deliver two 26-foot U. S. Army power boats to Portland to be used as tenders from the forts of that city. The men, two in each boat, got as far as here (North Haven,) their boats covered in an icy spray, and with their clothes wet and benumbed with cold. They remained at the Lodge for two days before proceeding on their journey. While here the temperature remained around the zero mark. **MATINICUS** – The people of Matinicus have been very fortunate in obtaining as nurse Miss Rebecca Douglass of Chester, SC. She came here from the sanatorium for crippled children at Atlantic City, which was run by the North American Newspaper Co. of America. Previous to this she had spent two years in France during the World War and also had done public health nursing in Calumet, Mich.

Miss Douglass has endeared herself to the people, going about wherever she is needed in sickness, in all kinds of weather, with a helping hand or a word of cheer. She has organized a first aid class in the school and with the very helpful cooperation of Miss Heath, the teacher, is doing excellent work there.

All are grateful to Mr. Guptill and MIss Knowlton for their part in securing Miss Douglass for public health work here.

Courier-Gazette February 19, 1931

An auto truck owned by Miles Sukeforth was being driven on Carver's Pond Tuesday morning when it broke through the ice, but later it was hauled out. Mr. Sukeforth and Willis Kossuth were on the truck when the accident occurred.
