

12-31-2020 EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER (EOC) COVID-19 UPDATE

State Updates

As of December 30, 2020 there were 12,480 active cases reported in the state (an increase of 5,168 cases since our 12-18-20 Update) and 24,201 total cumulative cases statewide. Currently there are 171 active cases in **Knox county** (an increase of 71 cases since our 12-18-20 Update). The state's **positivity rate is 5.43%**. Word on the Street

Sometime within the next few weeks, Vinalhaven EMS is expecting to receive a first dose of the vaccine for first responders. Additionally, ICMS will receive their first allocations of the vaccine from the Maine CDC sometime in the coming weeks. Maine CDC allows healthcare centers to include all staff as well as contract workers, such as maintenance and janitorial personnel, in their vaccination schedule. This

means that there may be a few individuals on the island who will be vaccinated in the coming weeks, even though they are not healthcare workers. Because these few individuals are associated with ICMS through the work they do in the facility, they are eligible to be vaccinated in Phase 1 of the state's vaccination plan.

Tip of the Week: **Wear Your Mask!**

Many people think that when they get the vaccine they will no longer need to wear a mask. This, however, is not true. Even though



studies have shown the vaccine prevents people from developing COVID-19 symptoms and becoming so ill they need to be hospitalized, they don't show whether the vaccine prevents someone from carrying COVID-19 and spreading it to others. So it's possible that someone could get the vaccine but could still be an asymptomatic carrier and could transmit it to others. This is the main reason why we can't stop wearing masks after we get the vaccine.
