GOVERNOR MILLS EXTENDS STATE OF CIVIL EMERGENCY

As the State continues to respond to COVID-19, Governor Janet Mills today signed a proclamation extending Maine's state of civil emergency for another thirty days through May 15, 2020. The original state of civil emergency was scheduled to expire tomorrow, April 15, 2020.

A state of civil emergency places Maine on highest alert and allows Governor Mills to deploy all available state resources to protect the health and safety of Maine people and to take every action she reasonably deems necessary to help respond to and protect against the spread of COVID-19 in Maine. It also eases Maine's access to critical federal aid to boost response efforts.

"I wish this proclamation was not necessary, but the continued spread of the virus demands a sustained response by the State," said Governor Mills. "There will be difficult days and weeks ahead, but I am confident that Maine people will continue to step up to meet this challenge, just as we have in the past, and together we will get through this. For now, I continue to urge Maine people to do their part and stay apart. This is the best way we will defeat this virus and protect the state we all know and love"

Staying Home = More Waste, More \$\$\$ Recycling = Less Waste, Less \$\$\$

With time on our hands, and families home together, this is a great time to organize recyclables, and learn new habits that we can continue when life returns to normal. The fewer bags that go "over the log" the more we all save – individual households, and all the taxpayers of Vinalhaven

As you know, we have had single-stream recycling for well over a year, and most of us are putting our cardboard and obvious items in the recycling bin.



How about setting a goal for the family to recycle ALL recyclable items? Ideas

Assign a "watcher" to look over the trash bag once or twice a day to "catch" and remove anything that can be recycled. Set a prize for the best finder!

Work as a team to make your trash bag smaller than your recycling pile.

Here's the Short List of What Can be Recycled with Single-Stream

Rigid plastic containers, with lids attached

Metal containers, such as soup cans

Glass jars and bottles

Newspaper, office paper, scraps of paper, cereal boxes

What CAN'T be Put in the Single-Stream Recycling Bin

Plastic bags, even if they have a number on them. But you can save them and drop them off at many big box stores on the mainland (Hannaford, Lowes, Walmart). They don't take up much room (they stuff well), and they're light to carry if you're walking on the ferry

Metal that didn't have food in it, like metal wire and pieces of scrap metal. These can go in the metal pile.

Waxed cardboard (You can tell if it's wax by scraping your finger on it. Wax will come off. Bait boxes have wax, milk cartons don't.)

Styrofoam

Bubblewrap and bubblewrap mailers

Not sure if something can be recycled? "When in doubt, throw it out!" Or even better, keep it aside and check with the transfer station attendant, from six feet away!

for Single-Stream RECYCLING

Single-Stream is EASY! Everything goes in one bin – NO SORTING! Follow this guide to make sure ONLY recyclable materials get put into the recycling bin.



Plastic

must have #1-#7 symbol on it be rigid (no plastic bags, plastic wrap, etc.) be a container empty and rinse



milk & juice jugs detergent bottles food containers all rigid containers marked #1-#7

plastic bags! (shopping, frozen food, zip-lock, animal feed, soil, etc.) bubble-wrap, shrink-wrap plastic envelopes to-go cup lids



Paper Cartons

empty and rinse, remove plastic caps

milk & juice cartons drink boxes aseptic containers

wax-coated paperboard



Cardboard & Mixed Paper

must be clean and dry (no greasy-gross pizza or food boxes) all clean cardboard paperboard boxes newspapers, mail catalogs, paper bags office paper, envelopes wrapping paper, books phone books, clean paper plates, shredded paper (in clear bag)

wax-coated cardboard shredded paper that's NOT in a clear plastic bag (bag gets sorted out by hand at recycling center)



Glass

jars and bottles, all colors empty and rinse (if containing solids) remove caps

clear & colored glass bottles & jars window glass



Metal

tin and aluminum empty and rinse

tin cans aluminum cans & clean non-balled-up foil empty aerosal cans (cooking spray, paint, etc.) pots & pans, jar lids

scrap metal regular paint cans gas cylinders of ANY size
