

Islands Community Medical Services announces the launch of a new Remote Patient Monitoring (RPM) service for hypertension. This service provides continuous tracking of a patient's blood pressure and related signs and symptoms and alerts the patient's healthcare provider to changes that warrant attention. Using secure digital conferencing technology, patients can now manage their health and stay in touch with their provider – all without setting foot in a doctor's office.

Remote monitoring enables a provider to intervene quickly when necessary and focus resources on the patients who need care the most. This can improve patient health and safety and decrease unnecessary, costly utilization, such as ER visits and hospital admissions. English zoologist Desmond Morris suggested that human beings rose to their position of dominance on the planet because we were more adaptable than other creatures. As we left Marion and continued on our way home, I was surprised to notice how much my spirits were lifted. I literally felt as if I had just won the lottery. I hadn't even noticed how deflated I was until my chats with Stephanie and Marion.

Being the highly adaptable creatures we are, somehow, we have managed to find ways to cope with this awful plague (those of us fortunate enough to have escaped the worst of COVID). I'm adapting, I'm doing OK, but boy I can't wait to sit on the porch with my neighbors for an hour or so, talking about absolutely nothing.





August A Good Month For Island Boats

In spite of the hurricane threat—which delayed the setting of new traps—and a week of fog. August was a good lobster month, on the whole. The difficulty around the rocks, after shedding season, was to find a place to set another pot., they were so thick together. At this writing, there is a little falling off, but most lobstermen seem expectant of good fall fishing.

Five men are busy afternoons on the Bickford cars, with Henry Ewell in charge of buying. Henry estimates roughly do double duty after the other

an average haul of 200 pounds; but one man, who's son goes with him, is reported to have had 600 pounds one day and 500 pounds another. Don Oakes August. There were only fifteen Sr., pound-keeper, Ricky Oakes, Don Martin, and Bryant [Coot] Eaton help weigh, plug, and crate the Bickford lobsters as they are brought in.
