Browntail Moth Awareness Month

February 2022

Browntail Moths (BTM) are a threat to the health and safety of both humans and the trees! February 2022 has been recognized as Browntail Moth Awareness Month in Maine to encourage people to take action to mitigate the negative impacts caused by this invasive insect. Areas with hardwoods are especially susceptible to infestations, which lead to long-lasting tree defoliation and branch dieback, as well as the spread of the caterpillar's microscopic, toxic hairs -either from touching a caterpillar or from hairs that have become airborne- that can cause trouble breathing and skin irritation similar to poison ivy, which can last for a few hours or up to several weeks. The hairs can remain an irritant for several years!

February and March are the best months to clip and destroy the webs of BTM, before the caterpillars hatch in April or May. Here's what to look for when identifying BTM webs:

 2-5" long white silk web tightly woven around a leaf or leaves (small brown hairy larvae within dense silk)

 Wrap of white silk tying leaf petiole to twig
 Webs occur more commonly on twig ends (not branch crotches) of oak, apple, shadbush, cherry, beach plum, and rugosa rose

Keep in mind that for those you can't reach, a licensed arborists may need to be hired. More identification information, images, and videos -as well as a plethora of other helpful BTM resoucres- are available online at: www.maine.gov/dacf/knockoutbtm

Last Hoorah for Whaling



"Honeymoon" snapshot of John Calvin Beggs Sr. and Bertha Alma Smith. Married (VH) April 17, 1913. They had one son: John C. Beggs Jr. born in 1932. US Navy Veteran 1950s to 1970s.

John Beggs Sr., was a Vinalhaven, ME, fisherman and the following boats were owned by him:

<u>Bertha Alma</u>: Named for his wife, built at Vinalhaven, ME (federal license no. 8). Issued April 26, 1916. <u>Bertha Alma</u> was gasoline powered, 32-ft. long, 9.6ft. wide with a depth of 4.8 ft. She was engaged in the cod fishing trade.

<u>Mishawaka</u>: Rubber boots fishermen used on Vinalhaven (then) came from Mishawaka, Indiana.

Others in this article: Wilfred R. Lloyd "Mouse" (1914-2003), Alfred Stillman Osgood "Stilly" (1890-1960), and Thomas Edward Libby (1870-1932)

VINALHAVEN—A few whales are reported in the bay around Vinalhaven nearly every summer. Mouse Lloyd had a scary experience only last season off Roberts' Harbor when a whale came up almost under his small boat. Some men in a larger boat near by shot at the whale and while their small ammunition had no effect on the big mammal, it did drive it off.

But never have there been whales so great in size or numbers hereabout as in 1918. That year the bay was full of them; according to Captain Stillman Osgood, now captain of the island passenger boat, *Vinalhaven II*. Sitlly ought to know for he took part in the local expedition after the whales that year. Ed Libby, of the Lane-Libby Fisheries, was the instigator of the project, and several whales were killed and blubbered here for the oil. Some whale meat was put in the company's cold storage plat, and a few who tasted it said it was somewhat like beef, but the general opinion was that it was too old when cut up.

Another local man who took part in this commercial whaling experiment is John Beggs. In fact, it was his boat, the 30 foot *Bertha Alma*, that they pursued the big game. Captain Butler, one-time captain of the Matinicus mail boat, was employed by the fish firm, and two Portuguese men, originally from the Virgin Islands, were brought up from New Bedford.

Stilly Osgood did the steering, and John Beggs tended the engine, while the whales were shot with the bomb from a shoulder gun. So great was the explosion that they lost the all-brass gun every time it went off, recovering it with a line tied to the boat.



The Observer Back in the 50's and 60's The Cascade Lanes was Vinalhaven's very busy bowling and pool emporium. League bowling took place every night and the town was divided into imaginatively named teams of men and of women involving nearly all the town's adults. Similarly cyclical pool and billiard tournaments meant the place was jumping nearly every day and certainly every evening. I was one of about a dozen adolescent pin setters who risked life and limb, certainly fingers, to return ten candlepins to their respective standing positions after each three ball frame was bowled. A few of the aforementioned men found it more satisfying to knock the pins down with a ball that never touched the alley but rather sailed straight through the air sending pins flying in all directions. For ten cents a string, my fellow pin setters and I huddled on a little ledge above the lanes as deadwood flew in all directions. Three strings would give us the 27 cents we'd need for a pack of Camels.

Fun Birthdates

Abraham Lincoln, February 12, 1809...a self-taught lawyer, legislator, vocal opponent of slavery, and was elected the 16th president of the US. His Emancipation Proclamation paved the way for slavery's abolition, while his Gettysburg Address stands as one of the most famous pieces or oratory in American History.



Did you know...The story of conversation hearts began in 1847, when a Boston pharmacist named Oliver Chase invented a machine that would make it easier to produce medicinal lozenges. simplified the process with his lozenge cutter, often considered the first candy-making machine. He focused on candy making and founded the Chase and Co., later became New England Confectionary Co or Necco. (Necco wafers)

In 1866, Daniel Chase (Oliver's brother) devised a way to press words on to the wafers. Daniel's candies or "motto lozenges" were not heart shaped until 1902. Before that, they were discs, scallop shells or fun shapes like baseballs, horseshoes, etc. The hearts were a big success.

In 2018 Necco sold it's candy production to Spangler and they returned, in 2020



This immediately brough back a flood of memory, of obligatory grade school card exchanges, some given with high expectation and those others not received. Of course, also remembered were those miniature heart candies with partially legible Valentine expressions and made and tasted of chalk. Most prominent was that one gift intended to impress a special woman during college. It was warmly received but over many years from cryptic comments he pieced together the full picture. Back at the dorm, the women were showing gifts received. When it came to her, the coterie of roommates and friends expressed bemusement and sympathy but silently wondered how long that relationship would last. It was a perfume holder, a glass disk enclosing a small vial all surrounded by an ornate filagree of brass decorations. It bore a close resemblance to a gothic reliquary, those containers in European cathedrals holding the bones or other relics of long dead saints. Apparently, there was a misjudgment on his part. The relationship did survive, and it ultimately gave rise to his grandson. The grandfather thought and picked something safe and conventional yet elegant. "Flowers, even one will please." 




